From the Tumuaki desk this week ...

COVID RESTRICTIONS LIFTED

On Monday the government lifted all COVID pandemic restrictions.

This is another positive step back to normality, pre-Covid conditions. I guess things will never really be the same. However, it is important as adults, as a school and as a community we focus on showing our students/your children that we are very positive about the future, so they can relish the new opportunities that are available post-Covid.

I have seen in the last few weeks this positivity in relation to our school. Many ex-pupils, ex-parents, ex-Board members and ex-PTC (Parent-Teacher Committee) members have been back visiting. This is another sign that people are enjoying what was common-place prior to the pandemic (March 2020). In early March 2020 people may recall supermarkets being swamped by people buying toilet paper, hand sanitiser, masks and tinned food as we entered an unprecedented time in New Zealand and world-wide with lockdowns, Alert levels, traffic light conditions, vaccinations, home-learning, zoom meetings and uncertainty about the future. History shows that many major events in New Zealand and world-wide like earthquakes, floods and wars play havoc with people's ways of life and well-being. Like wars, one never knows when a pandemic will end and this has been incredibly unsettling for people, communities and nations.


We endeavour to shield children from all the 'fall-out' of such times. History again shows us this isn't always possible and they do affect children's learning, social interactions and well-being. Some children struggle with anxiety and may struggle to attend school or perform as well academically, emotionally and socially as they did prior to the crisis. This was also evident after the Christchurch earthquakes 2011. Many politicians, social commentators, media commentators, financial experts etc are what I call doomsday merchants when in fact what children need in a time of crisis is positivity – that things will improve!

All the prior planning is only partially helpful and successful. Every school in NZ had to develop a pandemic plan in the early 2000s (most were like 50 pages long). Documents like that are only partially helpful when a crisis occurs and I suspect like us it was hardly viewed as we received significant advice from the government, the Health department and the Ministry of Education. It was very much a case of playing 'what was in front of us!'

What I have noticed recently is the vast majority of our children love being at school and can't wait to be here. Huge accolades to our staff for making it a fun place to be and a place where the children can socialise and learn once again. My philosophy being - school should be 'the best party in town'. This has been severely tested in the last few years but when one considers what we have all experienced.....we have done well.

Politicians are quick to point the finger at educationalists for poor academic performances and attendance rates and try to 'fix' it by introducing numerous, mandatory reforms - new programmes, curriculum changes, curriculum refreshes, demanding new Strategic Plan formats, more documentation, mandatory testing regimes, and on and on it goes. It is time we let staff get on with teaching and providing high quality experiences so children can progress and improve socially,

emotionally and academically. It is trying times for the Politicians and the Ministry of Education always want to provide quick fixes with an array of so called 'reforms'. Let teachers get on with the job of teaching and not bogged down in documentation and new programmes and curricula reforms. I have been impressed with the Richmond School Board's and management's attitude about how they have whole-heartedly back our staff. Our staff do an incredible job and deserve a multitude of accolades not brickbats like many politicians like to deliver in spade-loads. In fact, one of the outcomes of the pandemic is the levels of attainment at Richmond School showed the importance of children receiving daily instruction in the 3 Rs in the school setting. Home-learning was only partially successful. Our teachers are in turbo mode endeavouring to lift attainments now children are at school, achieving above the national attendance rates. There is a direct correlation between high attendance rates and levels of achievement.



At last week's Board meeting I provided the Board members with our Term 2 2023 attendance figures. The Ministry of Education analyse attendance figures nationwide.

This graph shows nationwide and our school's attendance rates – the first blue line being coed schools in NZ, the darker line being the rates of attendance in the Nelson/Marlborough/West Coast region and the third being rates of attendance in Contributing schools (Years 1-6). The diamond shape depicts our students and the black dash the nationwide attendance rates. Overall you can see the nationwide is 59%, a while ago it was as low as in the 40s. Our overall rate is 76%. This is significantly higher.

To explain the definition of 'Regular' attendance. 'Regular' attendance means a child is at school 90% of the time or higher. In a usual term of 10 weeks there will be like 95 - 100 school days. So, if a child with Covid was away isolating for 7 days (and possibly away from school for 5 days) plus say 5 or 6 days away due to having a cold or the flu then they can be below the 90% threshold.

Our children are doing really well but there is always room for improvement. I would like to thank parents for their help by endeavouring to have your children at school as often as possible, healthy, well fed and ready to learn. Onwards and upwards I say!




Book Week is a FULL SCHOOL EVENT coming up in Week 7.


WAIMEA INTERMEDIATE PARENT EVENING
