PARKING AROUND SCHOOL

We are very fortunate that the 'Church on the Hill' allows parents to park in their carpark. We have to man the entry as only 34 cars can park in the carpark (a church decree). One of our management team is usually there by 2:50pm monitoring the number of vehicles. Please comply with the church's decree or our school community may not be able to use their carpark any longer.

The TDC parking wardens have been patrolling areas outside schools in the Richmond area especially at the end of the school day. They are especially targeting people parking in disabled carparks without the appropriate parking permit and people parked, or even stopping, on broken yellow lines.

The law is quite clear surrounding yellow lines. I quote directly from the 'NZ Road code' – relevant bullet point from a section entitled – 'Where not to park':

"For your own safety, and the safety and convenience of other road users, there are certain areas where you must not park. You risk being fined and/or having your vehicle towed away if you park in these areas."

At present one of the parking wardens is frequently monitoring the carparking around our school and is giving out tickets to transgress.

He mentioned the other day about the number of car drivers still think it is Ok to stop on broken yellow lines waiting for their children to get into or out of their car. This is likely to attract a fine from now on, if he sees you doing so. Please take this as fair warning.

Here is a link to the latest information about the increase in fines (from 1st October 2024) with the important ones for car drivers in our school are:

- For parking on broken yellow lines the fine will increase from \$60 to \$100.
- For parking in a park reserved for those displaying a disabled sign an increase from \$150 to \$750.

- In the 10 minute parks outside Richmond Pre-School on Oxford Street. Please leave these for the families attending the pre-school.
- At the neighbouring chiropractor's carpark on Oxford Street.

CHILDREN ON OUR GROUNDS OUT OF SCHOOL INSTRUCTION HOURS

We are always very happy for families to use our grounds and adventure playgrounds out of school hours. It is always neat to see mums and dads here helping their children learn to ride their bikes or gain confidence to use our adventure playground equipment. However, recently we have notices children coming back to school unsupervised. We don't provide out-of-school hours supervision – this is the responsibility of parents. On a number of occasions children as young as 5 or 6 are here unsupervised. This can be very dangerous as often there are others here and especially when older children (teenagers) are present. Parents please be vigilant about this.

PLEASE HELP US KEEP THE GATES CLOSED NEXT TERM

Next term, we have a new little 5 year old starting who rather likes to run out of the institution grounds they attend (if they can). Attempts have happened at the early childhood they attend. I would like parents and other children to assist us by making sure all gates are <u>closed at all times</u> until this little person understands the importance of staying within our school boundaries.

This year the 'Church on the Hill' has hired their hall out to an organization called 'STEM School' each Wednesday. My guess is approximately 20 children attend this programme. This educational organization has nothing to do with our school. However, the parents of the children involved drop the children off in the morning and then pick them up between 2:30 – 3:00pm. This has led to even more congestion around our school in terms of carparking for our parents. My suggestion is for parents to look at parking elsewhere on Wednesdays afternoons in particular.
